
THE LITTLE SISTERS OF THE POOR CELEBRATE 150 YEARS IN AMERICA

"The (American) public appear delighted to see that we are willing to work for the poor; that we ask no endowment; that we desire to trust in Providence and in the generosity of the public."

Founded in France in 1839, the Little Sisters of the Poor have a rich history in the United States.

Well before the existence of Ellis Island, the first Little Sisters journeyed from France by boat and set foot on American soil in Brooklyn, New York on September 13, 1868. After receiving their first Residents they communicated back to the motherhouse, "The (American) public appear delighted to see that we are willing to work for the poor; that we ask no endowment; that we desire to trust in Providence and in the generosity of the public."

With courage, humble charity, and the ability to adapt to their new circumstances these pioneering Little Sisters were embraced by America. During the next four years and with the advice of local bishops and benefactors, a total of 13 Homes were established in the United States including Cincinnati, Baltimore, St. Louis, Philadelphia, and Boston. In March of 1881 the Little Sisters arrived in Providence, RI and lived for two years in the General James Estate. In 1883 the Little Sisters moved to Pawtucket and resided in the Holy Trinity Home, property donated by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Banigan.

Home in Providence was established in 1881 and is a testament to the faith of our foundress, Saint Jeanne Jugan, "Give us the house — if God fills it, God will not abandon it!"

September 2018 will mark 150 years since the Little Sisters of the Poor arrived in the United States and opened that first Home in Brooklyn. A rich history indeed!

Stay tuned for 150th anniversary activities here at Jeanne Jugan Residence in the spring of 2019.

A jubilee year will take place between August 30, 2018 and August 30, 2019.

An Initial Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated on Monday, April 9 at St. Nicholas of Tolentine, Jamaica, NY. For the past year or so a verse from the beginning of the Gospel of Luke, when Mary visits her relative Elizabeth, has been ringing true as a kind of personal theme in my life. In Luke 1:45 Elizabeth says to Mary, "Blessed is she who believed that what was spoken to her by the Lord would be fulfilled."

This verse perfectly describes how I felt before traveling from Broomfield, Colorado to serve as a Hospitality Aide at the St. Jeanne Jugan Residence in Pawtucket, Rhode Island.
